

Constitutional Law and Empire in legal education in inter-War Britain

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This talk examines the ways in which Empire influenced the development of constitutional law during the inter-War period. It looks at the influence of Imperial law on the curriculum and exams in the British Civil Service Administrative Division, the Council of Legal Education, and the University of London. It will also canvass the manner in which imperial law shaped the scholarship of key members of the academy at the time, looking in particular at academics such as William Ivor Jennings.

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
